PASTOR'S PAGE

Dear friends in Christ,

Our purpose statement says that we are gathered to worship, care, and grow, and sent to love like Jesus. Our pattern of weekly gathering is a significant way God shapes us, as individuals and as a community, to be disciples and members of the Body of Christ.

Last spring, we asked for your input about the worship services you generally choose to attend and why, as well as what service schedule you think allows us to best participate in God's mission in this time and place. The congregation's leadership read the feedback carefully and had thoughtful conversations about it. If you were at the congregation meeting in December, you heard about upcoming plans for incorporating what we learned, and I wanted to share a little more here.

There was no clear preference when it came to keeping our two current services or going to one service, with roughly equal numbers of people in support of each option. When it came to the reasons for the choices, generally what we found was that those who preferred keeping two

services value the choice it provides worshipers, both in time and service style. It also tends to both those who need an early start and those who have limitations that mean getting ready takes a good deal of time in the morning. As for those who preferred one service, the primary reasons for that were using our resources well and, especially, gathering the whole congregation together to build unity better. There is value in all those ideas.

The council has decided to modify our worship schedule beginning with the new program year in September of 2024. Most Sundays we will continue with two services at 8 and 10:15. But we will also begin A.C.T. on 1st Sundays. A.C.T. stands for All Church Together. On the first Sunday of each month, September through May, we will come together for one service at 9:00 a.m. We will also follow this time with a congregational event. Sometimes these events will focus on fellowship, sometimes on a service project, and other times on faith formation. They will be for all ages, and we hope that everyone will participate as we grow together as the Body of Christ!

We know that there is the possibility for confusion with service times that are not the same every Sunday of the month. We will be doing everything we can to publicize the new schedule, starting now and continuing through the next year as we try this new pattern. And "try" is an important word there. We will absolutely be evaluating how it is working for the congregation and deciding whether or not to continue it after this coming year.

Thanks for sharing your feedback with us when we asked for it last spring, and thanks to the congregation's leadership for their part in discerning this way forward. Look for ways you can support and participate in our preparation for *A.C.T. on 1st Sundays* in the coming months. Thank you for your partnership in ministry!



30); Panera pickup on Tuesday evenings around 9 p.m.; Hillandale eggs, 6 to 7 cases per pickup; and unloading trucks at the pantry on Thursdays and once a month on a Wednesday. You will be rotated in the schedule of volunteers for the month. You will not have to pick up each week. We are thankful for the generous donations of the food stores, especially Walmart through Feeding America which has donated 66,698 pounds of food, 23,149 pounds of which was meat. Weis donated 9,157 pounds, of which 5,843 pounds was meat. Rutters has donated 6,956 pounds of food. The Spring Grove Dairy Bar collected 399 pounds of nonperishable and \$1,100.00 in donations. The "Fill the Bus" event sponsored by

Spring Grove School District resulted in 5714 pounds of

nonperishable food and \$120.00. In the 10 years of this event, they have donated over 75,000 pounds of food. We have not been distributing milk for several months now, since we are unable to get it for free or at a reduced rate.

Hillandale provides us with free eggs. Help is needed to keep the pantry running to help those in need in our community. Harvest of Hope is a necessary organization to help

The first two Sundays in February bring us to the end of the season after Epiphany. On February 4, the 5th Sunday after Epiphany, Jesus lives out in his ministry God's promise to strengthen the powerless.

Transfiguration Sunday is February 11; Jesus' identity is affirmed by God before his disciples, echoing the words of his baptism. In preparation for Lent, we will bury the alleluia.

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on February 14!

It seems like a strange mashup for the day—flowers and chocolates... and ashes. But really, Lent (and all of our life with God) is all about heart—God's heart of love for us and God's renewal of our hearts through Christ. This Lent, we're going to focus on A New Heart. Ash Wednesday, <u>February</u> 14, 7 p.m. ~ Getting Real About Our Hearts

1st Sunday in Lent, <u>February 18</u> ~ God Renews our Hearts Through Promise

2nd Sunday in Lent, <u>February 25</u> ~ God Renews our Hearts Through Self-Giving

3rd Sunday in Lent, March 3 ~ God Renews our Hearts Through Community

4th Sunday in Lent, <u>March 10</u> ~ God Renews our Hearts Through Forgiveness

5th Sunday in Lent, March 17 ~ God Renews our Hearts Through Drawing Us to Jesus

Faith Formation this month: Opportunities to CARE and GROW

The **children's education ministry** continues during the Sunday school hour in February, using the Connect curriculum.

For **adults**, we are suspending the Thursday morning Bible study for now, as it appeared not to be a time or format that worked for many people. Pastor Sigrid is offering an evening study option on Tuesdays at 7 p.m., based on the Ten Commandments. This study began in January and will continue through March 12. It's not too late to jump in, even if you've missed the first few!

And on Sunday mornings during Lent (beginning February 18), there will be an adult conversation time at 9 a.m., too. We're calling it, "Heart to Heart." It's less a Bible study and more an opportunity to connect with
